- B. **Cheating:** Copying, or creating an academic exercise with or for permission from the class-assigned faculty member; paying someone to complete assignments; using any unauthorized materials to assist on assignments; misusing study aids such as Chegg, Quizlet, Course Hero, etc., to complete or pass class assignments; using test banks or copying answers from another source or student. This also includes unauthorized use of AI tools, such as ChatGPT, Dall-E, Alpha Code, Tensor Flow, Scribe, etc., and any act or behavior that gives the student an unfair advantage.
- C. **Fabrication:** Creating or falsifying transcripts, doctor's notes, supervisor recommendations, etc.
- D. **Facilitation:** Helping another person engage in academic misbehavior (including, but not limited to, sharing course materials without permission).
- E. **Misrepresentation:** Misleading an instructor or supervisor that work was prepared, or that a student is the author of work, for oneself on any academic work.
- F. **Plagiarism:** The unauthorized use of someone else's scholarly or academic work, language, ideas, or other material as your own without proper citation in an academic exercise (including, but not limited to, copying text, images, or audio; using a summary form); recycling a previous assignment as a new assignment without appropriate acknowledgment.

- EE. **Unauthorized Recording:** The creation, use, maintenance, display, or transfer of any recording (including audio, video, etc.) without permission where there is a reasonable expectation of privacy.
- FF. **Weapons:** Except as expressly authorized by law, possessing or using dangerous items on University property including, but not limited to, firearms, guns, knives (larger than the approved blade length), tasers, stun guns, BB guns, replicas, nun chucks, or other devices designed to eject shells at a high rate of speed; any violation of the [Gun and Weapon Regulation](#).

C. **Sexual Misconduct:** In accordance with [Va. Code § 23.1-900](#), the University is required to retain a student's transcript if suspended, dismissed, or expelled from the University where the student respondent withdraws from the University

X I Student Behavioral Record Retention and Reporting

The Assistant Dean is the keeper of student behavioral records and has decision-making authority on requested disclosures. The University retains records for no less than seven (7) years in compliance with the [Jeanne Clery Disclosure](#)

or expulsion) 4 (e) be retained for a minimum of 7 years after the date of the incident. The 2012 Clery Act requires that the University maintain records of disciplinary actions taken by the University against students and faculty or professional staff.

XX. Student Record Expungement

A student may request the expungement of their student behavioral record no sooner than one year after their most recent incident.

The Office of Student Accountability & Academic Integrity will consider the following factors when deciding to expunge a student's behavioral record. Some of these factors include, but are not limited to, the severity of the offense, the student's history of offenses, the student's participation in a pathway project, and the student's current academic standing.

Certain classifications of students may be ineligible for expungement according to program requirements. Expungement means the case will not be a reportable record to third parties. Due to the University's obligations under the Clery Act mentioned above, the record will not be destroyed until it is permitted by the Act.
